The Tallest One

It was the summer of 2006. Two scientists were hiking in a California forest. The forest was filled with many tall redwood trees. The scientists were looking for the tallest ones. "Michael, get back here," one of them said. "Here is a really tall one." He was right! They named the tree Hyperion (hi-PAIR-ee-un).

To measure Hyperion, a man climbed all the way to the top. It took a long time. Hyperion's lowest branches are 200 feet above the ground. He used a bow and arrow to shoot ropes over those branches. Then he climbed up the trunk of the tree. He wore a helmet. He had a radio to talk to the people on the ground.

Up, up he climbed. The branches near the top were small. It was scary to go all the way up. But he did. When he got there, he dropped a tape measure down to the ground. Hyperion measured 379 feet tall. That's 70 feet taller than the Statue of Liberty! It is the tallest tree in the world.
